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HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE MINUTES – JANUARY 15, 2025 CODY M. KELLY, CHAIR

MEMBERS PRESENT: Mr. McCarron, *Mr. Meaker, Ms. Harvey, Mr. Bush ALSO ATTENDING: Chairman Burtis, Mr. Romeo; also see attached list

Chair Kelly called the meeting to order at 12:31 p.m. and the previous meeting's minutes were approved.

- **1.** <u>LEAD</u>: Jessica Vinceguerra, Deputy Director Strategic Initiatives, Office of County Executive; Rebecca Shultz, Deputy Commissioner, Health Department; Marty Skahen, Community Development
 - a. INFORMATIONAL: Onondaga County Lead Programming
- Since 2022, received \$12.2M for lead poisoning prevention from Onondaga County and American Rescue Plan
 - o 2022 \$3.7M
 - o 2023 \$5M
 - o 2024 \$2.5M
 - o 2025 \$1M
- Housing Remediation
 - o Since 2002, county received ~\$41M from HUD to administer the Lead Hazard Reduction grant program (LHR)
 - Remediated lead-based paint hazards in over 2,000 homes
 - o 2019, county received 11th grant and met goal of remediating lead based paint hazards in 220 units
 - October 2024, awarded \$7.7M from HUD to continue LHR program
 - County added additional \$1M
 - Will remediate lead based paint hazards from 270 units over the next 4 years
- Windows, Doors & More
 - The program abates lead based paint where OCHD has an open violation
 - Partner with Home Headquarters
 - Program replaces windows and doors in rental properties in high risk zip codes
 - Funded through Onondaga County (\$1M) and NYS Division of Homes and Community Renewal (\$1.3M)
- Training & EPA Certification
 - o Grant program requires EPA certified contractors be used
 - COVID-19 resulted in lack of certified contractors and supply shortages
 - o Partnered with Eco-Testing to provide 3 types of local trainings
 - County covers the cost of trainings for individuals working in homes built before 1978
 - 348 certificates have been issued since January 2024
- Train the Trainer
 - o County funded program to increase the number of EPA certified instructors
- Lead Testing and Education
 - o OCHD offers free blood lead level testing to children in need of a test
 - 9,423 children were tested in 2024
 - Mobile Lead Van visited 28 unique locations including:
 - Gifford Street WIC office
 - Syracuse Community Health
 - White Branch Library

- Site based indoor testing was provided at:
 - Sankofa
 - Tucker Missionary Baptist Church
 - Head Start
 - WIC satellite locations
- O Staff completes outreach and education on a regular basis within the community
- Case Managers help provide:
 - Coordination of services with medical and community partners
 - Child behavior risk assessments
 - Exposure investigations
- Lead it Go Program
 - o Launched in 2024 for school-aged children with an elevated blood lead level (EBL)
 - Program ensures developmental milestones are met
 - Children with EBL are offered this free service by case manager and Lead Poisoning Prevention Program
 - 2 new staff will be identifying and contacting families of children eligible for services
 - Eligible students include those not already enrolled in Early Intervention, Head Start, Pre-K programming
 - o Funded through Onondaga County and grant funds

Questions/Comments from the Committee:

- How many classes are there?
 - o 3 different courses
 - RRP (Renovations, Repair and Painting) 1 day course
 - Offered once per month to property owners, landlords, maintenance companies
 - Do not need to work under a supervisor
 - Syracuse City Lead Ordinance requires RRP training when there is an open violation
 - Abatement Supervisor 4 day course
 - Offered once per quarter to company owners
 - RRP course is a pre-requisite
 - Abatement Worker 2 day course
 - Enhanced version of RRP course offered once per quarter
 - Abatement Worker must work under Abatement Supervisor
 - o Do not need to work under supervisor if RRP course already completed
 - Course is good for 5 years
- Who takes most advantage of the classes offered?
 - o Most advantage property maintenance companies and landlords
 - o 2nd most contractors
 - Least advantage private homeowners
- Are real estate companies still required to have a lead advisory disclosure?
 - o Yes, although very generic
 - o When OCHD has an open violation, a licensed EPA certified contractor must do necessary work
- Is the county far enough along where results are able to be seen on an annual basis?
 - o 2025 will be the most accurate year
 - o Anticipate seeing an increase in the number of units per year
 - o Recently awarded the largest HUD grant for lead hazard reduction in 270 units
 - o County funding has also been awarded towards abatement and remediation
 - o Completed 3 units at potential foster care homes; 6 more will be done in 2025
 - Averaged \$21K per unit
- Lead initiatives are a priority for this body and this administration
- Partner local dollars with federal HUD money and state grant money
- Some people have the idea that other communities are doing things that Onondaga County is missing
 - o Always open to ideas from other municipalities

- Have regular check-ins with HCR (Homes and Community Renewal)
- o Neighboring counties ask how the Onondaga County program is organized and administered
- Spending 1 full year of training is remarkable
- Excited for 2025 with trained professionals
- What parts of Onondaga County have been served and where will future sites be?
 - The map located on the county website shows all units done since 2010 through county grant program
 - o Link to map: http://www.ongov.net/health/lead/initiatives.html
 - o HUD grants are typically 4 years
- What part of the county is most in need?
 - City of Syracuse
 - o NYSDOH prioritized areas of concern which overlaps with high risk areas set by Department of Code Enforcement
 - o 70% of grant will be in the City of Syracuse and then out to the suburbs
- Do Foster Care applicants go to the top of the list for remediation?
 - Only county dollars go into the Foster Care unit
 - County dollars are not tied to income eligibility or other requirements for HUD grant
 - Review process is shorter
- Has the fact that the NYSDOH is suing landlords for the lead issue made it difficult for the county to access those homes?
 - There have been times that landlords with open violations have reached out
 - Have not seen a big issue
- Is it true that positive testing through the Lead Van has been low and not many kids are being missed?
 - Health Department
 - 2024 testing data will be finalized in about a month
 - On par to see an increase in the number of children tested; not necessarily an increase in EBL
 - Office of County Executive
 - Tested 400 SCSD Pre-K children during the summer of 2024
- On a statistical level, can larger conclusions be drawn based on the study?
 - Health Department
 - SCSD testing has all been voluntary; did not get high participation rates in a couple schools
 - Need to find out why testing was declined
 - 400 is a good sample size to draw some conclusions, but cannot say it is representative across the district

- Do lead pipes come under county jurisdiction?
 - o No, City of Syracuse handles within the city
 - O Distributed 2,000+ water filters between Thanksgiving and Christmas at the following locations:
 - 2 full days at WIC on Gifford Street
 - Salvation Army Christmas Bureau registration days
- Is water tested for lead pipe contamination in other county schools?
 - o Will test school aged children if valid concern is received
 - o County focuses on testing 1 and 2 year old children due to:
 - Crawling on floor and putting things in their mouth
 - The most neurological impact is at age 1 and 2
 - o Many children associated with primary care providers are assessed each year when they go to the doctor
 - o Not the county's responsibility to replace lead pipes

- Does the county help with filters?
 - Yes, with distribution, but not with plumbing
- Does the county check lead in water or just the child?
 - Health Department
 - Have not encountered a situation where water is believed to be the source of exposure in a private home
 - Lead paint dust is the primary source of lead contamination within the community
 - If dust is found during home inspection, it is listed as the exposure cause
 - If no lead paint is detected, or no other hazards exist, the water will be tested
- It is always the dust from window sills or chipping paint on the wall?
 - o Health Department
 - Dust could get into the soil outside where children are playing
 - Office of County Executive
 - The City of Syracuse is responsible for testing the water with the EPA
- How is outreach going with new Americans?
 - Home country could be the source of EBL
 - o Outreach teams have worked with Northside organizations
 - o Lead Van has been at Northside Festival, Northside Learning Center
 - Distributed filters at old Bob's School
 - 95% of attendees were new Americans
 - o County has many languages represented amongst inspection team, also use LanguageLine to communicate
- Is there enough funding and how much is currently available?
 - o Anticipate 2025 to be a big year for production
 - o Have \$1.3M award that program administrative costs will come out of
 - o Full abatement cost is \$40K per unit
 - o A 4 family home is considered 4 units
- How are projects prioritized?
 - o Priority is given if a child is in the home
 - o Eligibility is based on income, not zip code
- Are there zip codes outside the city that are considered higher risk?
 - Health Department
 - There are some, maps have been created to show where children have been identified
- Is there light at the end of the tunnel with this issue?
 - Office of County Executive
 - Abatement and grant funding is going to be key
 - There is more work to be done, but much farther along now
 - o Community Development
 - All initiatives funded by the county are working together to better locate and address the problem
- It is a finite problem, there are only so many homes built within the timeframe with a child that has this problem
- The CDC has lowered the level referred to as elevated blood lead level
- How has that affected the levels currently seen in Onondaga County?
 - Health Department
 - Onondaga County follows recommendations of NYSDOH who has not adopted the 3.5 micrograms per deciliter
 - If recommendations are adopted, caseloads will increase with additional requirements for follow up
 - Office of County Executive
 - Since COVID-19, have not required a child with an EBL to be in the home in order to do the work
 - Having a child in the home makes it a priority over other cases
