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HEALTH & HUMAN SERVICES COMMITTEE MINUTES – AUGUST 21, 2024 CODY M. KELLY, CHAIR

MEMBERS PRESENT: Mr. McCarron, Mr. Meaker, Ms. Harvey, Mr. Bush ALSO ATTENDING: Chairman Burtis, Mr. Romeo; also see attached list

Chair Kelly called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m. and the previous meeting's minutes were approved.

- 1. **HEALTH:** Rebecca Shultz, Director of Community Health
 - a. Amending the 2024 Onondaga County Budget to Accept JUUL Settlement Funds (\$1,452,272)

PURPOSE:

To accept \$1,452,272 in funds from the settlement of a multi-state agreement with e-cigarette company Juul Labs (JUUL) for its role in the explosion of youth vaping throughout New York and Onondaga County.

BACKGROUND:

Numerous class action lawsuits were filed against vape manufacturers for intentionally marketing their products to teens and for minimizing the harmful effects of vaping. The NYS Attorney General co-led efforts to reach a multi-state agreement that will benefit youth across all of New York State.

As publicized in June, more than \$4.7 million will be awarded to Central New York counties, the City of Syracuse, and to BOCES in support of schools. Onondaga County was awarded over \$1.4 million.

The money must be directed to evidence-based practices to address under-aged vaping and e-cigarette addiction. The Onondaga County Health Department currently operates Tobacco-Free CNY and the Adolescent Tobacco Use Prevention Act (ATUPA) program, as well as enforces the NYS Clean Indoor Air Act in Onondaga.

Program activities funded by the settlement must fall into these categories:

- Public education campaigns to prevent e-cigarette use among young people.
- Community, school, and university-based anti-vaping programs.
- Vaping cessation services in communities, schools, and colleges.
- Enforcement of vaping laws and regulations.
- Public health research into e-cigarette use among young people and the effectiveness of anti-vaping programs.

The Health Department will be focusing on public education campaigns, supporting anti-vaping programs, and enforcement activities through efforts of both the Divisions of Community Health and Environmental Health.

Ouestions/Comments from the Committee:

- Does "enforcement" mean providing undercover operations of purchases?
 - Yes, currently working on age and flavored restrictions

A motion was made by Mr. McCarron, seconded by Mr. Meaker to approve this item.

- Will the money will be spent over a period of several years?
 - o 2 disbursements in 2024; remaining will be annual

- o Health Department get back to the Legislature on the exact time frame of disbursements
- Will the money be advocated by a committee or how will that work?
 - o BOCES and SCSD were also allocated to receive part of the funds
 - o Health Department will touch base with leadership of other agencies to make sure efforts are not duplicated
 - Working internally with tobacco use partners to see what needs have been identified

A vote was taken on the item. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

2. VETERANS SERVICE AGENCY: Anne-Marie Mancilla, Director

a. INFORMATIONAL: 2024 Budget & Program Update

The mission of OC-Veterans Service Agency is to assist veterans, military personnel, and their families apply for local, state or federal benefits they may be eligible for. To provide information, assistance and advocacy for claimants in actions or claims against the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) or state and local veterans-related entitlements to include burial assistance.

We assist veterans and their eligible dependents apply for VA Compensation, Pension and Survivors Benefits. We also assist with burial applications for the OC-Veterans Memorial Cemetery. VA Pension and Survivors Pension are income-based benefits that are often applied for in conjunction with Medicaid as it is a requirement of NYS-Medicaid, if the applicant is eligible. We help claimants navigate this process, often with deadlines that, if not met, could impact their Medicaid eligibility.

The PACT Act (Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxins) was signed into law in August 2022 and has just hit its two-year anniversary. Nationally, The Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA) completed more than 1.7 million claims in 2022. Since the passing of PACT Act, VBA has approved 1,016,086 PACT Act related claims and is currently reviewing another 1,273,51 related claims. This significant increase has a direct impact on our daily operations, (see PACT Act Fact Sheet and information pamphlet).

There are a limited number of accredited Veteran Service Officers in our area. To legally assist a client with a VA claim, you need to be accredited by the VA. The VSA has absorbed the workload of several veteran organizations that have closed or stopped processing claims in the area. This has created space for illegally operating representatives to poach veterans and claimants. Veterans and claimants should never pay for VA claims assistance. There is an immediate need for VSO's.

Passing of The PACT Act expanded eligibility for veterans exposed to harmful toxins while in service, has generated an increase in inquiries to the VSA. In 2022 there were 2205 Interactions regarding VA claims. In 2023 there were 6805 Interactions and 4134 Interactions to date. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) continues to see an increase in PACT Act related claims.

In 2023, the VSA saw 640 clients in person, averaged 2300 phone calls, and assisted with 246 burial applications. We completed 103 fully adjudicated claims totaling \$165,000, resulting in VA Healthcare eligibility. This is an average monthly tax-free payment of \$1582 per claimant. The combined retroactive amount for these claims was roughly \$540k.

To date, in 2024 we have seen 567 clients in person, averaged 1500 phone calls, and assisted with 151 burial applications. Of the 370 submitted claims 35 have been fully adjudicated totaling \$50,000 with an average monthly tax-free payment of \$1430 per claimant. The combined retroactive amount for these claims is roughly \$196,000.

The VSA continues to meet the increasing needs of our veteran community by expanding access to accredited Veteran Service Officers, (i.e., walk-in clinics), maintaining multiple accreditations and increasing staff. We currently have seven full-time positions: one Director, one Assistant Director, one Senior-Veteran Service Officer, two full-time Veteran Service Officers, one Veteran Service Aide, and one Information Aide. The Director and Assistant Director are both accredited Veteran Service Officers who process claims. All Service Officers will maintain at least two accreditations to best serve our veterans. We have reviewed our contracts with Clear Path for Veterans (CPV) and Syracuse University Veterans Law Clinic. Both agencies are a large presence in our community and support our outreach efforts.

The VSA has assisted with on-going renovations at the Onondaga County War Memorial. Operation Shadowbox continues to grow, highlighting veteran friendly businesses and organizations in the community. The 54 shadowboxes are displayed throughout the War Memorial and provide a historic legacy to the importance of veterans in our community.

The VSA led the planning, coordination and execution with several veteran and military related events to include The Memorial Day Ceremony at Veterans Memorial Cemetery. The VSA also participates in special events at Clear Path for Veterans and other Veteran Organizations. The VSA played a large role in The Watch Fire 2024. We are assisting with coordination of the Veteran Expo and Parade on November 9, 2024, at The Fairgrounds and the Veterans Day Ceremony on November 11, 2024 at The Onondaga County War Memorial.

Staff of the VSA are involved with several veteran and advocacy groups on the local, state and national level. To highlight a few, staff attend the Onondaga County Executive Veterans Advisory Board (OCEVAB), The War Memorial and Cemetery Sub-Committee meetings and the Onondaga County Veterans Council (OCVC). The Director sits on Senator Gillibrand's Service Academy Selection Board and the Assistant Director is a member of the federal advocacy group, Military Family Advocacy Network (MFAN).

In 2025, the VSA will continue to encourage support of the following legislation, (see summaries).

Commitment to Veteran Support and Outreach Act (H.R. 984/s.106)-authorize federal funding to expand and strengthen County Veteran Service Officers. (CVSO's).

Purple Star School Program-State Legislation (S05960/A00547)-recognizing military connected children in our schools and providing resources.

Blast Overpressure Safety Act (H.R.80125)-amend title 10 United States Code to clarify roles within Department of Defense (DOD) relating to brain health initiatives, specifically TBI's. Currently it is difficult to obtain service connection from Veteran Benefits Administration (VBA) for Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) typically due to the lack in-service of evidence. The residuals of TBI are often deferred to other conditions, such as mental health or diagnosed headache/migraine condition.

The Blast Overpressure Safety Act will hold DOD accountable for proper documentation and provide the opportunity to explore brain health, viewing the brain as the physical organ it is and the correlation that these physical injuries have on neurocognitive behavior as well as mental health.

Moving forward, the VSA will continue collaboration with Clear Path for Veterans, The Vet Center, Syracuse VA Medical Center, local National Guard Units and other veteran organizations to ensure veterans and military members are receiving up to date information and assistance in obtaining their benefits.





What is the PACT Act?

The Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Promise to Address Comprehensive Toxics (PACT) Act of 2022

is a new law that expands VA health care and benefits for Veterans exposed to burn pits and other toxic substances. This law helps us provide generations of Veterans—and their survivors—with the care and benefits they've earned and deserve.

The PACT Act:

- Expands and extends eligibility for VA health care for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam era, Gulf War era, and Post-9/11 era.
- · Expands eligibility for benefits for Veterans exposed to toxic substances.





PACT Act Key Components



The Act expands and extends eligibility for VA health care for Veterans with toxic exposures and Veterans of the Vietnam era, Gulf War era, and Post-9/11 era.



VA will improve the decision-making process for determining what medical conditions will be considered for presumptive status.



Every enrolled Veteran will receive an initial toxic exposure screening and a follow-up screening every five years. Veterans who are not enrolled, but who are eligible to enroll, will have an opportunity to enroll and receive the screening.



VA health care staff and claims processors will receive toxic exposure-related education and training.



The Act **requires research studies** on the mortality of Veterans who served in Southwest Asia during the Gulf War; Post-9/11 Veteran health trends; and Veteran cancer rates.



The Act will help VA **build a stronger, more skilled workforce** to meet the growing demand for benefits and services.



The Act **authorizes 31 new facilities** across the country, providing greater access to VA health care.







Gulf War Era and Post-9/11 Eligibility

If a Veteran served in any of these locations and time periods, they are eligible for the new Gulf War-related presumptions. This includes the airspace above any of these locations.



On or After August 2, 1990:

- Bahrain
- · Iraq
- Kuwait
- Oman
- Qatar
- Saudi Arabia
- Somalia
- The United Arab Emirates (UAE)



On or After September 11, 2001:

- Afghanistan
- Djibouti
- Egypt
- Jordan

New Radiation Presumptive Locations



If you were called to respond to one of the listed cleanup and response missions below, you may be eligible for radiation exposure presumptives under the PACT Act.

Conditions Presumed to be Service-Connected

As of August 10, 2022, a long list of new conditions are presumed to be service-connected due to various in-service toxic exposures. VA encourages all eligible Veterans and survivors to file a claim—or submit their intent to file a claim—for PACT Act-related benefits **NOW** at <u>VA.gov/PACT</u>. Most Veterans who do so by August 9, 2023, will have their benefits, if granted, backdated to Aug. 10, 2022 (the day President Biden signed the bill into law).

- · Brain cancer
- Chronic bronchitis
- · Chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)
- Chronic rhinitis
- Chronic sinusitis
- · Constrictive bronchiolitis or obliterative bronchiolitis

- Glioblastoma
- Granulomatous disease
- Head cancer of any type
- High blood pressure (hypertension)
- Interstitial lung disease (ILD)

- Kidney cancer
- · Lymphoma of any type
- MelanomaMonoclonal gammopathy of
- undetermined significance (MGUS)
- Neck cancer
 Pancreatic cancer
- Pancreatic cancer
- Pleuritis
- Pulmonary fibrosis
- Reproductive cancer of any type, including cervical, ovarian, uterine, vaginal and vulvar

Health Care Enrollment Eligibility

WHO: All Veterans enrolled in VA health care


WHAT: A quick (5-10 minute) series of questions to identify and document any potential exposures to toxins during military service

WHEN: At least one every 5 years

WHERE: VA medical centers and clinics

WHY: Supports Veteran long-term health plans and informed, whole-health care

HOW: Veterans can ask about the screening at their next VA appointment







Health Care Enrollment Eligibility

Veterans who served in the following locations and time periods can enroll in VA health care NOW:

- · Republic of Vietnam (between January 9, 1962 and May 7, 1975)
- Thailand at any US or Royal Thai base (between January 9, 1962 and June 30, 1976)
- Laos (between December 1, 1965 and September 30, 1969)
 Certain Provinces in Cambodia (between April 16, 1969 and April 30, 1969)
- · Guam or American Samoa or their territorial waters (between January 9, 1962 and July 31, 1980)
- Johnston Atoll, or a ship that called there (between January 1, 1972 and September 30, 1977)



Vietnam-era Veterans are now able to apply for two new Agent Orange presumptive conditions:

- Monoclonal gammopathy of undetermined significance (MGUS)
- · Hypertension (high blood pressure)

Special Enrollment Period: October 1, 2022 - September 30, 2023

for Post-9/11 combat Veterans who separated or discharged between September 11, 2001 and October 1, 2013. Enrollment is free, there are no annual costs, and care may be free as well!





Filing Claims to Receive Benefits

Veterans can file a claim for the new presumptive conditions:

- New Claim—Veteran has never filed for the presumptive condition
- · Supplemental Claim—the presumptive condition was previously denied but is now considered to be presumptive
- If VA denied one of the new presumptive conditions in the past but the Veteran may now be eligible for benefits, VA will try to contact them. There is no need to wait to file a Supplemental Claim.
- VA is prioritizing the claims of Veterans with cancer to make sure they get timely access to the care and benefits they need.
- Pending Claims: If a Veteran's condition was added to the list of presumptive conditions* after the claim was filed, VA
 will consider it on a presumptive basis.



*Presumptive conditions do not require proof that the military service caused the condition. Veterans only need to meet the service requirements and have a current diagnosis of the presumptive condition. Veterans should submit any supporting documentation to assist with their claim.





Other Affected Veterans and Survivors

What about additional benefits and care for other Veterans and their survivors?



Under the PACT Act, survivors may be eligible for VA benefits, including Dependency and Indemnity Compensation and Burial benefits.

- You may have seen advertisements from lawyers, law firms, or others seeking
 to represent Veterans and others in litigation related to the PACT Act or the
 CLJA. <u>These lawyers, firms, and private parties are not connected with
 VA benefits or services.</u>
- Seeking relief under the CLJA will not influence VA's decisions and will not affect the amount of the benefits or health care VA can provide.
- Relief awarded by the court in a lawsuit brought under the CLJA must be offset by the amount of any disability award, payment, or benefit VA provided to you or your legal representative due to exposure to water at Camp Lejeune.

Avoiding PACT Act Scams

There's been an increase in <u>PACT Act-related phishing (email)</u>, vishing (phone), and <u>social media scams</u> targeting Veterans to access their PACT Act benefits or submit claims on their behalf. To report suspected scams, please contact the VA Office of Inspector General (OIG) Hotline at <u>VA.gov/oig/hotline/</u>.



Do:

- Securely submit your application directly to VA online at benefits.va.gov/benefits/applying.asp or in person at any VA Regional Office. VA will assist in gathering supportive evidence at no cost to you.
- Be cautious of companies that (1) claim to be contacting you on behalf of VA, (2) advertise VA benefits can only be obtained with their help, or (3) attempt to pressure you into signing a contract.
- If you're interested in working with a Veterans Service Organization, agent, or attorney, use the VA Office of General Counsel (OGC) accreditation tool at VA.gov/ogc/apps/accreditation/index.asp to confirm their credentials.

Don't:

- Don't sign a contract agreeing to pay an unauthorized company a percentage of your benefit payment in exchange for assistance with your VA claim.
- Don't sign forms that are not VA generated or a blank form for someone else to complete later.
- Don't be fooled by companies that advertise special relationships with medical professionals and say they can guarantee your benefits award.
- Don't provide personal information (such as your social security number) to anyone offering claims assistance.



When or How Should I File a Claim?



What if I have previously been denied?


Veterans previously denied a toxic-exposure related claim are encouraged to file a supplemental claim. Once a supplemental claim is received, VA will review the claim under the new law.



 - o Instagram, Facebook, flyers in VA center; do not do commercials
 - O Having an Outreach team is on "dream board" for the future
- Outreach is the next logical step for expansion in order to serve those who will not ask for help
- Are there metrics available to match eligible people with benefits?
 - VA has VetPop that tracks population
 - o Onondaga County is trying, but are missing quite a few groups
 - Overlooked groups are continuously on the front burner

 - Cleanout is a separate service that can cost up to \$5,000

 - o 46% of the population is over 60

 - Can purchase any fruit or vegetable



A transportation partnership with NYSOFA & Uber/Lyft that makes it possible for seniors to book on-demand or scheduled rides, 24/7, with just a phone call. There are no apps or smart phone required to use this service.

May 2024 - August 2024 Rides booked: 70



Blooming Health allows us to send information, alerts and announcements to the community we serve via voice calls, texts messages, or email for free. There are more than 26 language options and no internet or smartphone is required.







Provides seniors 60 and older with 2 free round trip rides; 1 round trip ride is equal to 100 miles

 - No restrictions on where they can go; hair dresser, visit a friend, casino, local bar, shopping, etc.
