# WAYS & MEANS COMMITTEE MINUTES – SEPTEMBER 15, 2023 BRIAN F. MAY, CHAIR

MEMBERS PRESENT: Mr. Ryan, Mr. Burtis, Ms. Abbott, Mr. Knapp, \*Mr. Kinne, Mrs. Ervin ALSO ATTENDING: Chairman Rowley, Ms. Cody, Ms. Kuhn, Dr. Chase, Mr. McCarron; also see attached

Chair May called the meeting to order at 9:34 a.m. The minutes of the previous meeting had been distributed, and there were no objections to waiving the reading. There were no corrections to the minutes, and the minutes were approved.

## 1. DISTRICT ATTORNEY:

a. 2023 Transfer Resolution (\$22,000) (Sponsored by Mr. Olson)

A motion was made by Mr. Ryan, seconded by Mrs. Ervin, to approve this item. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

- 2. WATER ENVIRONMENT PROTECTION: Shannon Harty, Commissioner
  - a. 2023 Transfer Resolution (\$2,270,000) (Sponsored by Ms. Abbott)
- 2 sizable unanticipated impacts to budget
  - Supplies & Materials Account
    - Try to anticipate supply chain issues with chemicals; contracts renew on 6 month basis, which had increases
    - Need additional \$1.6M
    - Proposing to fund through transfer of surplus funds in 2 accounts
    - 101 Employee Salaries anticipate \$1M surplus; hiring and recruiting, but have retirements
    - 413 Utilities last year needed budget amendment with utility rates spiking; rates have plummeted
    - Using \$600,000 from 413
  - Biosolids disposal Metro WWTP
    - 5 year fixed contract; first 4 years had stable costs related to biosolids at \$3M
    - Due to regulatory environment and restrictions of biosolids, landfill under contract (Ontario County) could no longer receive the biosolids
    - Had to find alternative location and rates went up significantly; over budget by \$670,000
    - 2024 budget anticipating cost increase continuing to escalate; did not renew contract
    - Good news is WEP is starting new biosolids sludge dryer
    - Started testing systems, which will reduce amount of biosolids sending to landfill and create opportunity for Class A biosolids
    - Have good plan in place to mitigate impact to biosolids

## \*Mr. Kinne arrived at the meeting.

- Biosolids are currently going to Seneca Meadows
- All landfills across NYS shutting down, do not want biosolids
- Never able to use unstable biosolids; Class A biosolids can be used as cover and have a cheaper disposal rate
- The dryer will get biosolids to that (Class A); will be able to cut costs to 1/3

## A motion was made by Mr. Knapp to approve this item.

- Bought sludge dryer 2 years ago; started building last year; dryer equipment installed this summer; started burners last week and will be going through systems
- Hoping to put sludge through it by the end of October; will have ribbon cutting
- Looking at fueling with WEP's methane; currently have natural gas service working with National Grid to run burners
- Long term, will look at what is the best use of methane gas and how to stabilize utility bills

#### Ms. Abbott seconded the motion.

- Lot of WEP's budget is driven by Metro WWTP; small changes at Metro means big dollars
- Working on how to find tune, monitor and stabilize the budget

## Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

#### 3. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT: Martin Skahen, Director

- a. Authorizing the Acceptance and Sale of Real Property Located at 3309 Howlett Hill Road in the Town of Onondaga (Sponsored by Mr. Burtis)
- Property acquired through Housing Development Fund Company
- House looked great from outside, and inside looked good, but major reconstruction and an asbestos survey
- Found asbestos, spent quite a bit of money to abate the asbestos
- Did masonry work and shoring up holes, then the basement flooded to the first floor; water an issue for a while
- Brought in an architect to find out what it would cost to be able to sell the house, but very cost prohibitive
- Asking county to take the property back and dispose to developer who can fix or demolish the house
- Do not usually run into this problem, and have not had to ask for this to happen; this one is an exception

#### **Questions/Comments from the committee:**

- How old is the house?
  - 0 1920
- Why did the county take possession of the house?
  - o Part of acquisitions of tax delinquent properties taking yearly from tax auction from Housing Development Fund Company to fix up and sell to low income first-time homebuyers
- The houses are usually taken from good neighborhoods, correct?
  - o Not necessarily; doing one with Land Bank in city right now in Eastwood on South Collingwood
  - o Most of the time, auction houses are out in the county
- Howlett Hill is a good area and a private developer should have taken the house
  - On the other side, Community Development (CD) is taking a property in a rundown neighborhood and will fix it up to make it one of the nicest houses on the street
  - o It will then be sold to a low income first-time homebuyer (80% of average median income)
  - o CD subsides the mortgage for \$30,000 to create life changing equity situation the person would never have
  - o Their mortgage is equal to rent, but the person owns a home versus renting
- Is this an exception to the rule?
- Typically CD does this successfully and can offer a first-time homebuyer a chance to get out of a cycle and be on a better trajectory
  - o Yes; also people doing work on the homes are independent contractors in Onondaga County who bid on the work
- The piece that government is involved in is getting people into home ownership to give them financial stability
  - O Yes, it is a life changer for a family
  - O Any social demographics will show that having a stable home results in better health, education and outcomes

- People that buy these homes will have equity in the home for a loan by the time their kids are in college, so the kid can go to college
- Been on Housing Development Fund Company Board for many years, and cannot remember last time the county had to take back home; this is the exception rather than rule
- Over the years, they have done many homes in Nedrow and other areas to make a difference in neighborhoods
- Absolutely a place for private sector, but private companies are not cutting price for first-time homebuyers to buy house
- Also, contractors used are on MWB list

A motion was made by Mr. Knapp, seconded by Ms. Abbott, to approve this item. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

- **4. FINANCE:** Don Weber, Real Property Tax Director
  - a. Approving and Directing the Correction of Certain Errors on Tax Bills
- Tax bills that are incorrect over \$2,500 need legislative approval to get the bills corrected
- A few listed are due to sewer rates, and one owned by NYS that did not get the state exemption

A motion was made by Mr. Burtis, seconded by Mr. Knapp, to approve this item. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

- 5. PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT: Carl Hummel, Commissioner
  - a. Accepting and Approving the Contract Between Onondaga County and the Civil Service Employees' Association, Inc., Local 1000 AFSCME, ALF-CIO, Onondaga County Employees Local 834
- Tentative agreement with CSEA (not correction unit) (Agreement on file with the Clerk)
- 4 year agreement 2023-2026
- Wage increases
  - o First year flat dollar amounts on schedule (compounding): Grades 1-5 receive \$2,500, Grades 6-15 receive \$1,750
  - o Applied to all current employees comes out to be 3.4% increase retroactive to beginning of year
  - $\circ$  2024 2026 is 3%
- Grade increases for 19 titles
  - o Appendix A shows the titles, current grade and grade agreed on with union
  - o Hard to recruit positions and some have fallen below market rate for the work
- Shift differential premium going from \$1.10 to \$1.50, then \$1.75 last year of agreement
- Children's Protective Unit (CPU) On Call or night service
  - o Premium that case workers receive based on when they do it, and their title
  - o Has not increased since 2012
  - o Increased by \$18 per level; matrix in packet
- CPU sometimes pick up overflow work from Child Advocacy Center
  - o Employees that are forensically trained and pick up overflow work will receive an annual \$175 stipend
- Modifications to calculation of overtime compensation premium, holiday eligibility premium, and continuous recruitment procedural
  - o Make it easier for county to administer programs and keeps it consistent with other labor agreements
  - o Change to way floating holidays earned
  - Have drug/alcohol testing policy as part of contract reasonable suspicion testing, not random testing
  - o Random testing will occur for those required under state and fed law

#### **Questions/Comments from the committee:**

- For grades 1-5, is the \$2,500 being added to the base?
  - O Yes, instead of a percentage, it is a straight \$2,500 on the base
  - O Next year the 3% will be on top of the new number

- Membership voted
  - O Yes, it was ratified; approx. 60% to 40%
- Why did it take so long to come before the Legislature?
  - Union ratified on August 8<sup>th</sup>
  - o Would have had to have everything to WMS by Aug 12<sup>th</sup>
  - o Enormous amount of work to process to bring over
  - o Could not have ready for September Session
- When will this go into effect?
  - O Upon adoption; many provisions go into effect upon adoption
  - o Wages retroactive to first full pay period of 2023
- What is the percentage going forward for the rates?
  - o 2024, 2025 and 2026 are all 3%
- If someone is in a job title in the union with experience, can the county hire them at an advanced step? Or do they have to be hired at step 1?
  - o Provision for advanced step hire under Appendix A Section 5
  - o Department Head has to request from Personnel Commissioner (who has authority to approve advanced step hire)
  - o It is based on either (1) difficulty of recruiting for position or (2) qualifications person has for the position
  - o Commissioner consults with civil service staff to determine whether it is appropriate or not

A motion was made by Mr. Knapp, seconded by Mr. Ryan, to approve this item. Passed unanimously; MOTION CARRIED.

The meeting was adjourned at 10:08 a.m.
