## Onondaga County seeks public input on hazard mitigation plan, may address HABs

The Syracuse-Onondaga County Planning Agency launched a survey to hear from the public on emerging hazards, such as harmful algal blooms, to help create a 2019 Hazard Mitigation Plan, the agency announced Monday.

In a press release, SOCPA said it is leading an update of the Onondaga County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan for the county and its participating municipalities. Originally created in 2013, the plan identifies hazards of concern in the region, assesses vulnerabilities to those hazards and seeks to identify actions that may reduce damage from future hazards.

The plan update may address new hazards including harmful algal blooms, invasive species and drought in addition to hazards already identified in the original plan which are flooding, severe storms, winter storms, land failure and earthquakes.

The county is utilizing a 25-question citizen survey to gain the public's input on the natural hazards that most affect the public and how. There is a survey for interested citizens, as well as unique stakeholder surveys for people who represent academia, business, emergency services, health care, public works or utilities.

The plan itself must be reviewed and updated regularly as it is required by state and federal agencies for Onondaga County communities to be eligible for certain types of non-emergency disaster assistance, such as funding for mitigation projects that reduce vulnerability and help the community become more resilient to disasters. The ultimate goal of hazard mitigation is lessen the impact of disasters and to reduce the loss of life and property.

SOCPA referred to hazard planning as a "wise investment," given that the Federal Emergency Management Agency cites that every \$1 spent on hazard mitigation prior to a natural disaster can save a community \$6 on future disaster losses.

During the plan's update and development process, a series of public meetings will be held to hear from the public and to present a draft 2019 Hazard Mitigation Plan to residents and local officials.

The Syracuse-Onondaga County Planning Agency (SOCPA) is now leading the update of the Onondaga County Multi-Jurisdictional Hazard Mitigation Plan, for the County and its municipalities.

The plan was originally adopted by the Onondaga County Legislature in 2013, and by participating municipalities.

Hazard mitigation, or hazard planning, provides an opportunity to identify key local actions to be taken to reduce or eliminate the long-term risk to human life and property from natural hazards. It is also a wise investment – the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) cites that every \$1 spent on hazard mitigation before a natural disaster hits a community

saves \$6 on future disaster losses after the fact.

The planning effort includes four phases:

- · Identify hazards that may impact the County and its municipalities;
- Profile the most relevant hazards and their potential consequences;
- Identify critical facilities and estimate the potential losses that could result from each type of hazard; and
- Develop a hazard mitigation strategy, to include hazard mitigation goals and actions designed to reduce loses

The primary hazards of concern to Onondaga County identified in the original plan include flooding, severe storms, winter storms, land failure and earthquakes. The update will also consider analysis of new hazards of concern, such as harmful algae blooms, drought and/or invasive species.

Ultimately, the mitigation projects and actions identified and implemented will reduce vulnerability and enable communities to become more resilient to disasters. Having a plan in place also allows the County and participating jurisdictions to be eligible for certain pre-disaster funding through FEMA. Examples of grant-eligible projects for flooding, our most extensive threat, include home acquisitions in flood-prone areas, local stormwater control measures along roads, or shoreline stabilization along waterways.


